Message from the Principal

It is hard to believe we have passed the midpoint of the year but thanks to your help we have reached this important milestone. The first 1/2 of the year has been filled with great moments of pride and important events for the entire Pollock Community. During the month of January, we had the opportunity to add to the list of important events by hosting two important parent meetings, our Community Partnership Meeting and Winter Title One Parent Input Meeting. The Community Partnership Meeting brought together representatives for Youth Core/CORA (aftercare provide); COMHAR (mental health.behavioral health providers; Education Works (socialized recess support); and other members of the school community to discuss services for families, supports needed from the school, and ways to support the school's mission and vision. The Title One Parent Input Meeting gave parents an opportunity to discuss needes for students; ways to access available resources; and chances to brainstorm additional resources that are needed. Both meetings provided attendees with important information about the school's mission/vision, budget, and a forum for rich discussion. Please stay tuned for upcoming meetings about the 2018-2019 school budget and our next Community Partnership Meeting (Feb. 9).

Also during the month of January, students in Grade k-6 took part in the AIMSWeb assessment for Reading and Math. While many students did quite well, it is important to know that students must make progress by the Spring test (May 2018). The targeted number of **words per minute** for each grade for the Spring are 53 (Grade 1); 92 (Grade 2); 119 (Grade 3); 136 (Grade 4); 143 (Grade 5); and 161 (Grade 6). For grade K, students need to score a 46 for Letter Name Fluency (number of letters named correctly); a 33 for Letter Sound Fluency (number of letter sounds said correctly); a 41 for Phoneme Segmentation Fluency (number of segments said correctly) and a 33 for Nonsense Word Fluency (number of letter sounds said correctly). For each of these test areas, reading in short bursts (1-3 minutes using a timer) each night can help. Teachers will share additional strategies and ways to support children reading at home during report card conferences.

Report Card Conferences are scheduled for Feb. 14-16 from 1:00 - 3:14 p.m. They are an excellent opportunity to discuss your child's academic progress and to inquire about specific areas of strengths and areas of needed improvement. Statements like "He is good at..." and "She does well in..." are not the most helpful. Our goal is to provide parents and families with detailed information about each child's academic progress as well as ways to accelerate student learning. Please ask about learning opportunities at home, appropriate websites for students with Internet access, or ways to determine if the book is on grade level.

Thank you for continuing to partner with us to improve the quality of education for all of our children.

Students should develop an solution-oriented mindset in every activity they engage in—homework, class assignments, projects, presentations, and at home task. Being proactive with in school and at home task is the way to go. Help your child by speaking the language of the 7 habits at home too.

Love for Literacy

It's hard to believe we are halfway through the school year aiready! Students have been working hard in literacy! Our Literacy block consists of Guided Reading, Independent Work Centers, Shared Reading, Read Aloud, Writing, and Saxon Phonics for students in grade K-2.

Phonics is the first important step to learning to read. Research shows that when phonics is taught in a structured way, starting with the easiest sounds and progressing through to the most complex, it is the most effective way of teaching young children to read. It is particularly helpful for children ages 5 to 7. Phonics instruction teaches children how to decode letters into sounds, a skill that is essential for them to read unfamiliar words by themselves. Having letter-sound knowledge will allow children to make the link between the unfamiliar print words to their spoken knowledge. Here are some free apps you can use at home to support phonics instruction:

PASA (Pennsylvania Alternate System of Assessment) Information

PASA (Pennsylvania Alternate System of Assessment) Testing will begin this month. All students who are eligible for PASA testing will complete the Reading, Mathematics, and Science assessments by April 13, 2018. The PASA is a statewide alternate assessment designed for students with the most significant cognitive disabilities. Specifically, it is intended for those who are unable to participate meaningfully in the PSSA (Pennsylvania System of School Assessment) even with accommodations.

Dear Parents,

We often overlook the benefits of good sleeping habits when we think about overall health, but good sleep is just as important and eating well and exercising.
